
Brookline, NH Economic Development

The Brookline Public Library staff, trustees, volunteers and friends were pleased to welcome a wonderful turnout of community members for our Open House on Saturday, September 12. It was a greater success than we could have hoped for, and we thank everyone for joining us.

Like all of our programs, the Open House was free and open to the public. The Brookline Public Library provides educational and recreational opportunities to residents, brings activity to the center of town, and promotes Brookline as a wonderful place to live and conduct business. Programs often include refreshments from local vendors, and our focus for 2016 programming will be local, local, local.

Upstairs in the Children's Library, patrons were treated to balloons, face painting, Legos, sand bowling and origami. All visitors enjoyed food and beverages sourced from local businesses. Recycling Makes Sense! Recycling Saves Money!



We are researching <u>new</u> recycling programs for the transfer station. They include the following:

Vegetable oil program

It is estimated that up to 3 billion gallons of used vegetable oil ends up in our landfills or down the drain. Recycled vegetable oil will be used for local heat recovery, transportation or electricity production. The acceptable cooking oil products include palm, soy, canola, olive, corn, peanut, cotton seed, sunflower seed and vegetable (usually as combination of several oils). These items must be in a liquid state. Lard is not acceptable.

Thermostats

The program accepts all brands of wall-mount mercury-containing thermostats. Manufacturers that historically branded and sold mercury thermostats in the United States help fund the program through participation and fees. The goal is to recover all mercury-containing thermostats.

Fluorescent bulbs

Today's lighting systems are more energy efficient and environmentally friendly than ever before. As systems are upgraded, mercury may be contained in lighting waste. Environmental regulations require this waste be managed properly.

Electronics

Over the last decade there has been remarkable progress in recycling electronic devices, but e-waste recyclers are facing enormous challenges these days. One measure of progress is recycling programs and the research information provided by the Consumer Electronics Association. The good news is drop off locations have increased and the quantity of recycled electronic material has increased.

Rechargeable batteries and cell phones

There are a variety of batteries designed for a number of different purposes. Cell phones come into this category because they contain batteries. As some batteries may use toxic materials, the goal is to keep them out of the trash.

Stay tuned as we continue to evaluate such programs for Brookline.
